At the WRCPC meeting on September 14, 2018, members agreed to continue explore taking on the role of the **Wellbeing Waterloo Region** (WWR) backbone

support function as the WWR transitions out of the Chief Administrator's Office (CAO) office. The CAO's office will continue to support WWR for the next 6 to 12 months and develop a transparent process for the transition of the WWR backbone function into the community. There will likely be a submission process.

Kathy Payette asked to be part of the working group for the emergent **strategic planning process**. Christiane Sadeler will be the staff lead for this working group. Staff will send out a meeting invite update.

Mary Anna Allen and Sarah Shafiq will work together to ensure that WRCPC members are registered for the November 7, 2018 **Community Consultation on Islamophobia** event.

At the **WRCPC retreat of September 14, 2018 and October 12, 2018,** Michelle Braniff, the Graphic Facilitator, visually captured some of the discussions and agreed to develop a narrative for both sessions (please see attached). Michelle will again join the WRCPC at the December 12, 2018 Council meeting.

The WRCPC Working Group Cannabis Report went forward to Regional Council on October 10, 2018. The focus of the report is on upstream prevention and the youth engagement strategy. Shayne Turner and Michael Parkinson are currently exploring further opportunities for sharing that perspective.

The Regional Council is still in the process of reviewing the reports related to this issue with the intention of providing feedback.


September 14, 2018 Retreat



The first conversation was about developing a new kind of plan that would be an emergent strategy for complex social conditions instead of trying to treat complexity as something that is complicated

- boxes hinder creativity and we need more room for what community needs to build capacity; more like large buckets – broad objectives and not boxes; leaving room for Indigenous ways of knowing full of spirit; flexibility like the way water moves
- note that some participants were wearing clown noses and funny hats and are identified in the graphic by their "costumes"
- looking for emergent response rather than a reaction to crisis (eg: opioid crisis where CPC was ready to respond although it was not part of the Strategic Plan
- discussion about connections through communication and community and concern about getting pulled away from priorities by fear; looking at the roots of crime
- looking for responsiveness and room to adapt and the budget needs to have this flexibility

October 12, 2018 WRCPC Retreat



Discussion about Convening a Round Table as the challenge of knowledge-mobilization:

There was discussion about bringing the learning to The Child & Youth Planning Table (many of the representatives at the table were part of this Planning Table)

- discussion about using the language of starting upstream and Root Causes of crime to develop a shared way of talking about and defining the issues; the Child & Youth Planning Table has opportunities to influence upcoming initiatives with respect to Smart Cities and Wellbeing Waterloo; there are many conversations happening in the Region and this toolkit provides an opportunity to "speak the same language" so that various sectors (such as the tech sector understand the Crime Prevention perspectives (currently, many different ways of defining the challenges); discussion about networks with principals and teachers etc.
- stars are aligned and there is energy after the election to make connections and spread the word and approach of upstream thinking; this is an opportune time to "move the needles" e.g.: creativity beyond technology – perhaps using technology so families seeking services do not need to tell their story over and over again to different service providers
- upstream thinking is about getting kids out in nature instead of on the computer
- discussion about asking the people (the youth); on the one hand, kids just want to play basketball; but need to have relationships with the kids for impact; once we have relationship and start asking what they need; discover that basketball is about relationships and movement; "when do kids feel happy?" when they are playing



Smart Update (Consent Agenda)

For the Meeting of WRCPC on December 14, 2018

The Consent Agenda is published on a bi-monthly basis. Please review this report before meetings.

Any Council member has the right to "pull" an item from the Consent Agenda and add it to the regular agenda for discussion, comment, or clarification. Approved consent agendas are published on the Council's <u>website</u> along with approved minutes. Consent Agendas are selective, not comprehensive. Whenever possible, Consent Agenda items reflect the key **approaches** of the Smart on Crime 2015-2018 plan designed to accomplish three overarching Council directions.

- Youth: Unleashing the Potential of ALL Youth
- Neighbourhoods: Building Local Capacity for Change
- Smart on Crime: Advancing the Momentum

Through four strategic approaches:

1. Expand Reach through Understanding and Engagement



- Three book covers were made from the Illustrations drawn by Sonia from Art Shine at the Porch Chat on transitions - a human book club. The illustrations have been framed and each presenter received a copy. The original drawings are now on display at the WRCPC office. They were also shared on social media to keep the stories alive.
- The WRCPC Reception "Beyond the Art of the Possible Past, Present and Future" held on November 22, 2018 at the Catalyst137 was overall a success. Approximately, 226 people attended the event to honour now retired Regional Chair Ken Seiling. The upstream approaches work of the WRCPC was presented along with suggestions on how the community can help to advance this WRCPC campaign. Lastly, a representative from the tech industry shared a message of commitment to continue to support inclusive community efforts.

- Over the past couple of months, WRCPC's work on the UPstream knowledge was focused on informing the development of the UPstream campaign and launching it at the November 22 reception. The talk introduced members of the community, including decision-makers and practitioners, to some of the key concepts from the UPstream knowledge i.e.
 - Systems and structures are the deep drivers of community wellbeing.
 - Upstream provides opportunity to address multiple community issues at once.
 - The uptake of the upstream efforts is effected of community values and priorities rather than any lack of knowledge.
 - We need mindful and compassionate planning and decision-making and practices.

Following the event, WRCPC received interest from several individuals and organizations about continuing the UPstream conversation in the community.

The WRCPC and the <u>Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network</u> released a 30 seconds public service announcement and a four minutes film highlighting aspects of *Canada's Good Samaritan Drug Overdose Act*, an act that grew from WRCPC research and on-going engagement with policy makers. The films feature local residents Christine Padaric, Larissa Ziesmann alongside Chief Bryan Larkin. The films compliment earlier print materials released last year by WRCPC and the Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network.

Special thanks are due to staff of the Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network for making collaboration so easy and successful. One-time funding was provided by the Law Foundation of Ontario for the print materials and the Waterloo Wellington Local Health Integration Network for the PSA and film. These resources have been shared by a variety of health units, policing agencies, and not-for profit agencies across Canada. We encourage WRCPC members to share this material with their networks across Canada. The resources are available at www.overdoseprevention.ca

WRCPC, Upstream Communications Working group with the support of Rees & Stager successfully completed and rolled out the Upstream Campaign. The campaign was designed to help amplify the message of UPstream approaches that featured in discussions at WRCPC meetings and was a central to the Justice Reception. The campaign includes branding, logo, website, and a number of other products. Please visit http://preventingcrime.ca/our-work/upstream/ and share widely. Thank you to all of the working group participants that spent months helping design this campaign.

2. Base Change in Good Evidence and Innovation:

The Cannabis Working Group of WRCPC shared their report with the Region of Waterloo Community Services Committee on October 02, 2018. The report highlights the need for investment in upstream prevention efforts via the Waterloo Region Youth Engagement Strategy (WRYES!) given that neither the act nor the supporting resources are oriented to the prevention of cannabis use. Ontario's use of cannabis amongst youth aged 15 years is approximately three times the rate of their peers in Iceland. Youth in Waterloo Wellington area rank higher in almost every category of substance use when compared to their Ontario counterparts.

The WRCPC submitted a similar report to the Province of Ontario's Social Policy Committee to assist in their review of <u>Bill 36</u>. The Report **An Ounce of Prevention** was finally shared with area MPPs and MPs.

- The WRCPC staff submitted comments for revising Canadian Drugs and Substances Strategy after encouragement was received by Health Canada staff to partake in this survey. The comments provided are consistent with the <u>opioid strategy</u> <u>recommendations</u> endorsed by WRCPC in April 2017.
- As part of WRCPC's annual retreat this past September, Council members took part in sharing of stories about WRCPC's contributions to change in the community. Researchers at Laurier's Centre for Community Research, Learning, and Action (CCRLA) collected the stories of change as part of their work on evaluating WRCPC's 2014-2018 Smart on Crime community plan. Analysis of the stories is underway and will be supported by an evaluation committee made up of Council members, Friends of Crime Prevention, and WRCPC staff. CCRLA is planning to share the findings with the Council in spring of 2019.
- The last part of WRCPC's historical analysis project (done in partnership with Conestoga College) is underway. A video production team has been contracted to create a whiteboard video highlighting key points and elements of WRCPC's history. The project is projected to wrap up in the first part of 2019. Knowledge products will include a (community-friendly) report, a timeline, and the aforementioned video.

3. Lead side by side - leverage dynamic partnerships:

- The final manuscript for WRCPC's work with Public Health Ontario's Scoping Review for Community-based Opioid Strategies will be submitted December 10. The Review team was comprised of representatives from Public Health Ontario, Toronto Public Health, University of Calgary, University of Toronto, the Canadian Public Health Association, and the Canadian Centre on Substance Use.
- The WRCPC has given formal notice to our collaborators locally, provincially and nationally that we are largely withdrawing from overdose/opioid/drug strategy efforts due to an absence of resources. Council directed staff to seek funding to support WRCPC's

substantial efforts in this area in 2016. No additional resources have emerged and we began declining opportunities in early 2018.

- The Canadian Municipal Network on Crime Prevention is submitting its final report to Public Safety Canada. Efforts to have the funding extended or lapsed dollars tagged on at the end of the funding cycle have been unsuccessful at this time. The network is sustaining its efforts mostly on contributions funding and though local resources. A planning meeting of the executive committee in early October in Montreal shows that the determination to sustain the network remains high. The need for social development efforts have grown across the country.
- Staff continue to support efforts in opioid response planning, the Integrated Drugs strategy as well as visioning for a made in Waterloo region supervised consumption site. The WRIDS and Public Health brought forward a report to the Community Services Coordinating committee on December 11. The report is available on the Region's website.

4. Advocate for Equity and Belonging. Reduce Marginalization and Discrimination:

- The Breaking the Silence committee held a third (and final) A Place Called Safe event in Cambridge on Oct 18, 2018 at the Idea Exchange. The focus of the event was to share results of the Outlook Study and to have a conversation with members of the LGBTQ2+ community and allies about where there are safe spaces in Waterloo Region. Conversations were robust. There will be a final report on all three events. The BTS volunteers have talked about next steps and are interested in facilitating similar events at GVI, the House of Friendship, and possible OneRoof.
- Chelsea's Life is a play about human sex trafficking that is brought to the community in partnership with SASC and the Registry Theatre. Rehearsals have started and are going well. Partners attended the first read through which was excellent. SASC is building a human trafficking syllabus for schools and will be leading a guided discussion after each performance. WRCPC has initiated a Community Engagement Committee that is identifying target audiences and how to reach them. Shows are Feb 21st-24th at the Registry theatre. There will be flyers and posters available at the Dec. 14th meeting. Tickets are for sale at https://www.registrytheatre.com/chelseasstory/ Please share this opportunity on social media as we start our promotional campaign in the coming weeks.
- The Violence Prevention Committee has "regrouped". They are preparing a Report on Violence Prevention (based on 2017 data) that can be easily shared and understood by

the members of the public, pulling in the UPstream messaging.

- In partnership with the Waterloo Region District School Board, Canadian Caribbean Association of Waterloo Region, The Congress of Black Women-Waterloo Chapter and a large number of community partners **The Black Brilliance: Redefining the Colour of Success** conference was held on November 30th. The conference engaged over 70 African, Caribbean, and Black identifying students from seven different WRDSB high schools. The conference was the result of over a yearlong engagement process with ACB students where they identified issues of anti-Black racism that they experienced in school and the community. Students also spoke of the need to discuss racism and to connect with ACB adults for guidance, support and inspiration such as M.P.P. Laura Mae Lindo, Assistant Deputy Minister (Ontario Ministry of Education) and <u>Dr. Eugenia</u> <u>Duodo</u> (CEO Visions of Science). The conference was the first of its kind, a resounding success and the intention is to have the conference be annual and be offered to all ACB students across all 16 WRDSB high schools. A summary report of the engagement and conference will be provided in 2019.
- In partnership with Bring on the Sunshine, African Canadian Association Waterloo and Area, Aids Committee Cambridge Kitchener Waterloo and Area and the Somali Canadian Association Waterloo Region was successful in receiving a grant from KW-Community Foundation. The grant is to be used to facilitate a number of community conversations with local African, Caribbean and Black community leaders, professionals and community organizations for the development of an ACB Hub/Network. The first of three community consultations has occurred on November 5th, 2018, in partnership with the community partners listed above and as well as the Faculty of Social Work-WLU and the Manulife Centre for Community Research. This first community consultation had over 70 participants. The remaining consultations will be held in 2019 with a report and next steps to follow.
