(Un)Safe

The unregulated drug markets remain toxic, unsafe, and unhealthy.

Safe supply initiatives provide pharmaceutical equivalents, such as opioids and stimulants, for people using unregulated drugs to prevent and/or reduce individual and community harms, including death, due to the acquisition, consumption, and criminalization of unregulated drugs.

Vulnerable to isolation, anxiety, fear, instability, unhealthy relationships, and trauma Enables self-determination and autonomy

Stability, reduced stigma, discrimination, and fear, new or improved relationships with family, friends, and community, less trauma



It is critical to recognize that not all people who consume unregulated drugs also engage in criminal activities other than possession offences—it is likely most do not. However, acquisitive crimes (e.g. break and enter, petty theft, etc.) are often committed to manage withdrawal symptoms when no other options exist. The Un(Safe) research demonstrates that people relying on the unregulated market do not wish to engage in criminalized activities, or be subjected to victimization.
